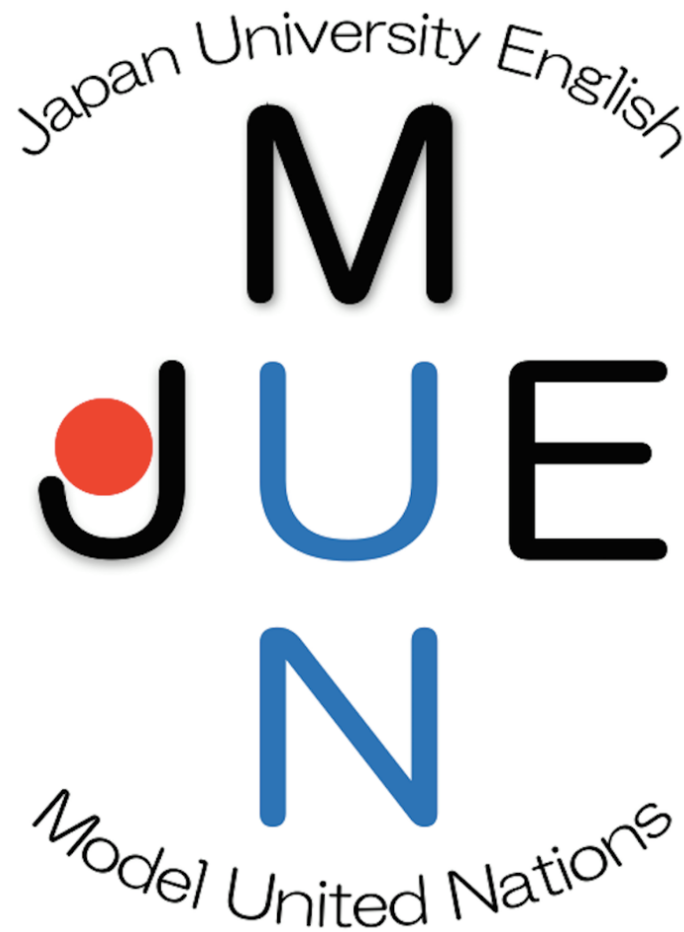

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Thanks and Appreciation

Thank you Professor Emerita Dr. Donna Tatsuki from Kobe City University of Foreign Studies (KCUFS) for the exceptional commitment and service you have shown in establishing and sustaining JUEMUN (Japan University English Model United Nations) since 2010, and the transdisciplinary GNS (Global Negotiation Symposium) since 2017. The first JUEMUN began when Professor Tatsuki was the JALT (Japan Association for Language Teaching) international conference co-chair, and she was able to persuade the conference team to allocate a meeting room for JUEMUN to run concurrently with the academic conference raising awareness and interest in MUN simulations. Since then, she has served on the JUEMUN organizing committee, been a KCUFS faculty advisor, designed and maintained the website, and looked after the conference handbook, along with organizing ceremonies and forums when KCUFS hosted the conference. Thanks to her initiative, GNS has been held simultaneously with JUEMUN, except for the last two years of the COVID pandemic, bringing together academics from different fields, diplomats, World Bank and UN representatives, and staff. GNS participants can observe students negotiating in a live MUN simulation and learn more about MUN simulations as a community of practice, and further value the importance of negotiation as a 21st century life skill. Always promoting research and practice through professional development, Professor Tatsuki spearheaded and co-edited a journal and book that included many of the presentations given at GNS: *Global Negotiation: Perspectives on Teaching and Learning* (Kobe City University of Foreign Studies Journal of Research Institute, 2018) and *Model United Nations and English as a Lingua Franca New Perspectives on Best Practices* (Cambridge Scholars, 2021). Selected areas of her research focus on descriptions of English as a Lingua Franca (ELF)-driven multi-party talk-in-interaction in MUN simulations and best practice in language teaching materials. Since 2007, she has co-founded and directed the KCUFS ELF MUN program, and supported other universities in Japan and abroad with MUN. JUEMUN 2022 Hosting University

Notre Dame Seishin University

Notre Dame Seishin University (NDSU) is a four-year women's college established in 1949 in Okayama by the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur. St. Julie Billiart, the first president of the university, stated, "Purify your heart and be a person of love." This became the founding spirit of the university. NDSU nurtures truly liberal people through education and research,



provides them with the means to carry out their social life and pursues the meaning of life together with them. In the present, NDSU has many sister colleges and affiliated schools all over the world.

NDSU contributes to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) with support from the NDSU Center for Regional Collaboration and SDGs Promotion. One such activity was the Gender Equality Project. Volunteer students who learned about women's empowerment through participating in JUEMUN 2020, decided to research the situation of working women in Okayama prefecture. Similar to the Model UN, but representing themselves rather than UN delegates, the NDSU students drafted resolutions on improving the lives of local working women and submitted them to Okayama Prefecture. The papers included measures promoting work life balance, ending sexual harassment, promotion of women leaders, and so on. Ultimately, their proposals were incorporated into the "Okayama With Plan," which is Okayama Prefecture's basic plan to realize a gender-equal society. This is one example of how NDSU encourages students who have local and global views to take action to achieve the SDGs.

NDSU has deep connections to the JUEMUN 2022 agenda. Main building and East Wing of Notre Dame Hall in the NDSU school building were constructed by Antonin Raymond in 1929, and they are registered as National Registered Tangible Cultural Properties as a valuable architectural heritage of early Showa Period modernist architecture in Japan. When you come to NDSU, please take a tour and enjoy how our school buildings have been preserved for over 90 years.

MUN and JUEMUN



What is Model United Nations (MUN)?

MUN is an academic simulation of the United Nations that includes debate, public speaking and international affairs. At a Model United Nations conference, participants, who are referred to as delegates, are given the opportunity to represent different countries on different committees.

Delegates participate in discussions on issues ranging from world conflict and international security, to human rights and education. Through these exchanges, delegates are able to develop and refine skills such as collaboration,

decision-making, critical thinking and verbal communication.

During a conference, delegates work together to create practical and innovative solutions to the issue they are discussing. These solutions are then incorporated into a plan called a working paper and then introduced to all of the delegates in the form of a draft resolution. The draft resolutions are then amended and voted on in hopes of passing and becoming a resolution. While most MUN conferences only last a few days, delegates often leave more interested in international affairs, more aware, more educated, and more thoughtful citizens of the future.



What is JUEMUN?

Japan University English Model United Nations, commonly referred to as *JUEMUN*, is an annual faculty-organized conference held in Western Japan. Since its inception in 2010, JUEMUN has grown into Japan's premier English MUN experience for university students around the world. JUEMUN participants come from places near and far bringing an

amazing array of backgrounds and perspectives, resulting in an exciting, engaging, and unforgettable simulation. Our 2022 conference will bring together over 154 participants from 11 different universities and 13 countries around the world.

JUEMUN was founded by Canadians, Professor Craig Smith and Professor Lori Zenuk-Nishide with the leadership and support of Professor Donna Tatsuki, who have combined their MUN experience of over 60 years to offer a unique and innovative learning opportunity for university students around the world. The annual JUEMUN conference is hosted on a rotating basis between Kyoto University of Foreign Studies, Kobe City University of Foreign Studies, and Notre Dame Seishin University.

Each JUEMUN agenda is chosen after careful extensive deliberation and discussion by the organizing committee. These chosen agendas are always issues of great importance to the world that need to be addressed with comprehensive and innovative solutions. At each JUEMUN conference, participants experience cooperative hands-on learning, allowing them to confront an issue in English from the perspective of their assigned country.

Through these experiences in the conference committee sessions, participants develop an appreciation of differing viewpoints, the frustration of negotiation, the rewards of cooperation, and a broader view of the human side of international relations and diplomacy. The dedicated conference support and guidance from JUEMUN faculty advisors as well as the knowledge and experience shared by the invited speakers, truly make each JUEMUN conference a professional and educational experience of the highest quality.

JUEMUN Opening Ceremony Guest Speaker

Sister Jean Stoner - *Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur*

From 2010-2016, Sister Jean represented the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur at the United Nations, advocating with others on global issues of poverty eradication, education for women and girls, sustainable development, and stopping human trafficking. Women and girls are the ones most affected by poverty, lack of education, migration, conflict, and climate change.

The oldest of five and born in Montana, Sr. Jean comes from a cattle ranching family. She treasures those early years in rural small towns. She entered the convent at 17, and began a lifelong journey with the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur.

A math and English teacher for many years and a high school principal, Sr. Jean later served two terms on the Leadership Team for the former California Province and as administrative support person for the SNDdeN Congregational Mission Office in Ipswich, MA.



Being at the UN meant learning how to navigate two new worlds—that of the bustling metropolis of New York City and that of the diplomatic arena of the UN, both a far cry from her childhood days on her grandparents' cattle ranch in central Montana.

Sr. Jean is currently the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Notre Dame de Namur University in Belmont CA and serves on a committee supporting the sponsored Notre Dame high schools and elementary schools in California. In her leisure time, Sr. Jean enjoys reading mysteries, doing word puzzles of any kind, and checking online news, Facebook and Twitter.

Specialized Committees at JUEMUN

At JUEMUN, delegates are assigned to one of 4 specialized committees in their meeting room. In each committee, delegates work together to co-write a working paper. As the groups are large and have equal representation from all 4 regions, sponsors and signatories are not required when tabling draft resolutions.

Working Groups

JUEMUN delegates cannot submit clauses or working papers (WPs) to their committee that were written before the conference. WPs are to be debated by all committee members in the spirit of cooperation and inclusion representing the diverse country and regional needs. Language proficiency, gender, or national background divisions should not be visible to those observing the group.

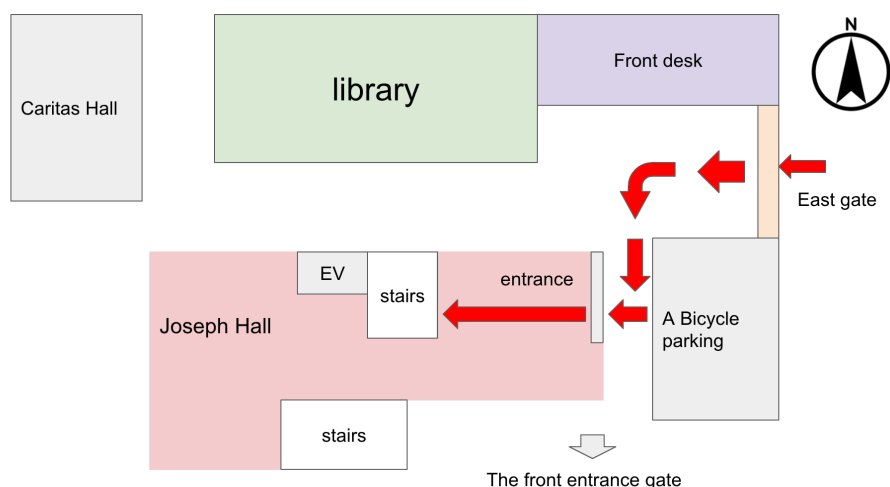
Notre Dame Seishin University Floor Map

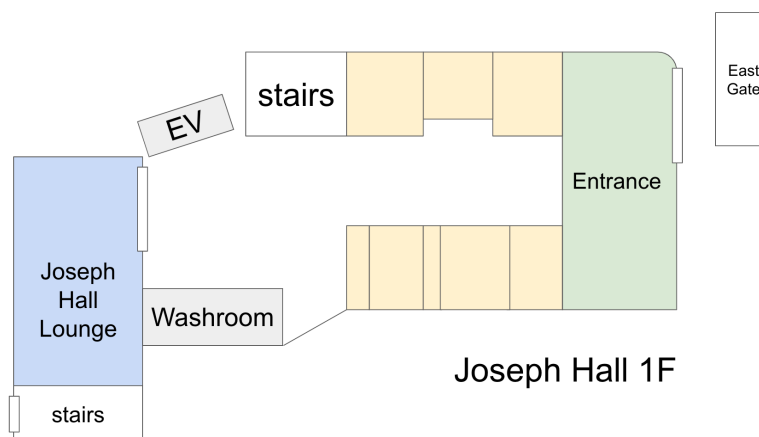

Floor Map of Joseph Hall

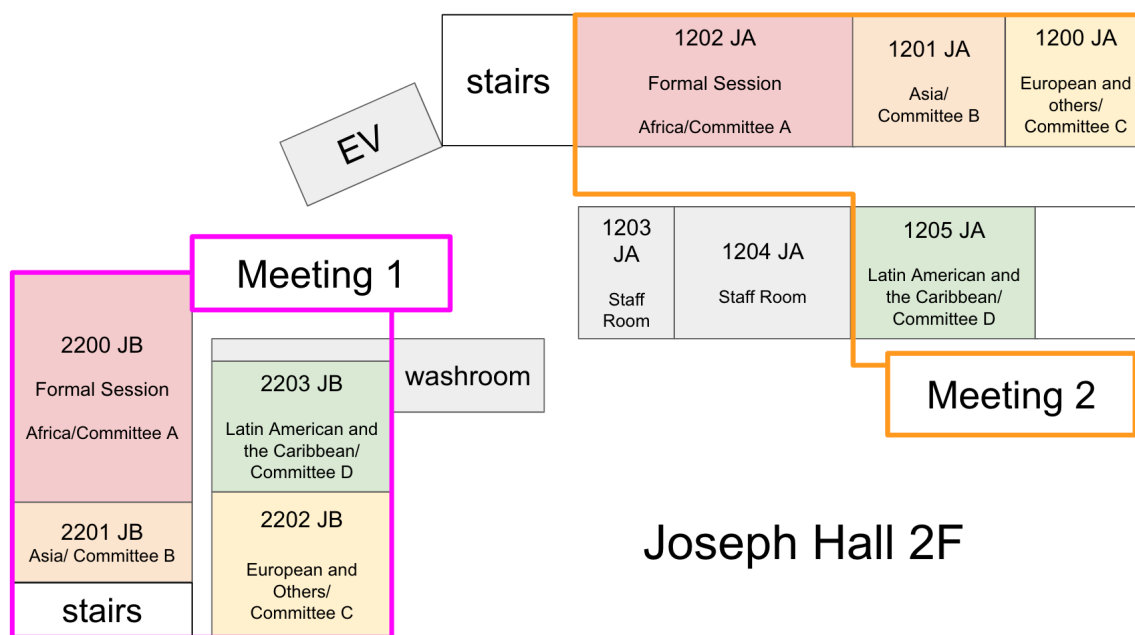
1st Floor

This is the 1st floor map of Joseph Hall. All delegates should register at the entrance, then go upstairs to go to their conference room.



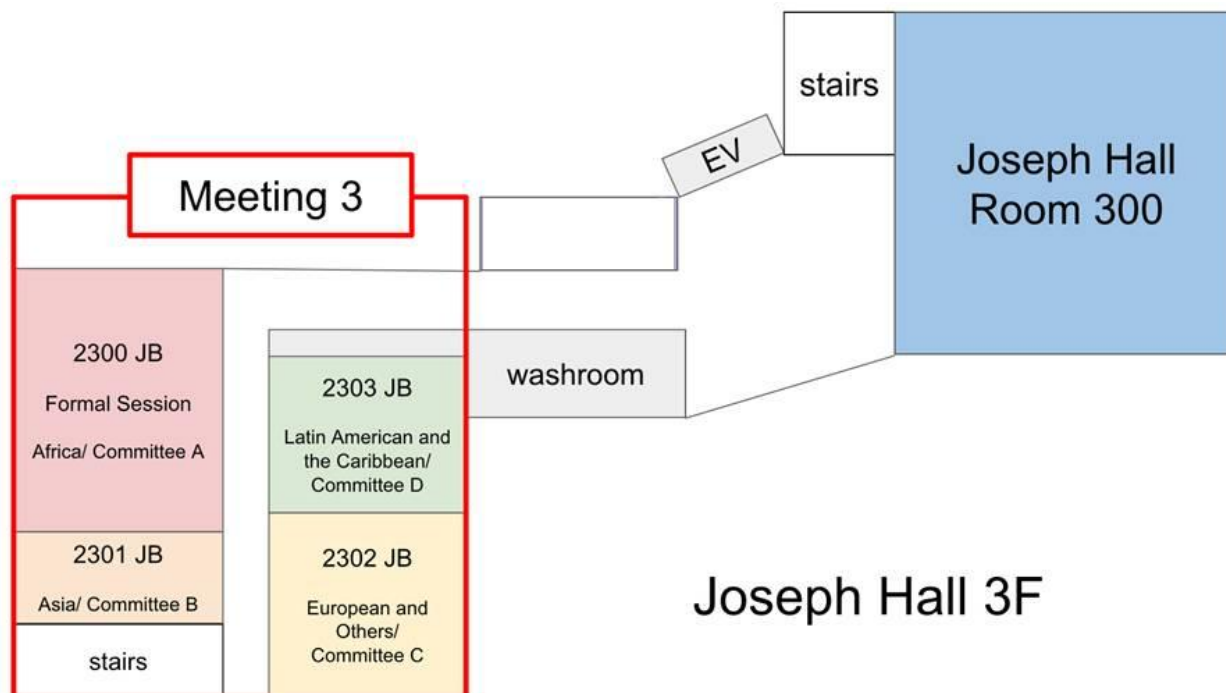
2nd Floor

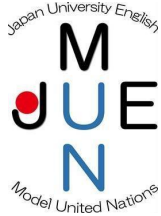

How to Add Your Country to the Speaker’s List

All delegates have to give a policy speech at least once, and the bureau highly recommends you to give a policy speech many times in the formal sessions to tell all delegates your representative country’s policy and your committee’s thoughts. The way to give additional policy speeches is to add your representative country namen on the Speaker’s list.

1. Make a note like the example using paper which you will receive.
2. Raise that note above your head in the formal session. A page will take it, and they will give it to the bureau.

Session 1: UNESCO Story Circles Workshop

13:00-14:15 UNESCO Story Circles for Building Intercultural Competencies

Dr. Tom Fast, Notre Dame Seishin University

Story Circles (Deardorff, 2020), originally intended to bring diverse or opposing communities together, help participants develop intercultural competencies (understanding, curiosity, empathy, reflection). Participants will learn how to conduct Story Circles by engaging in them together. They will connect with other participants and come away with the knowledge and materials to conduct Story Circles with their own students in the future.

Session 2: Safeguarding Global and Local Heritage

14:30-15:15: Excavating the Archaeological site of Kültepe in Turkey

Dr. Ryoichi Kontani, Notre Dame Seishin University

The Kültepe, located in the Cappadocia region of central Turkey, is a large trading town dating back some 4,000 years, where excavations since 1948 have uncovered some 25,000 cuneiform clay tablets. Most of these are economic documents. These are one of the best sources for understanding the ancient Orient, and were included on the Tentative List of World Cultural Heritage in 2014 in recognition of this. In

this time, the cultural potential of the site will be presented in the light of the latest excavation results.

15:30 - 15:45: Towards the Implementation of the Historic Urban Landscape

Approach: A New Challenge in Kurashiki 歴史的都市景観

In Kurashiki, we have learned about and deepened discussions on the "Recommendation on the Historic Urban Landscape" (UNESCO, 2011) for the future of sustainable urban development that makes use of historical assets. In that process, we are interacting not only with national organizations for community development but also with overseas experts. Here, we are introducing new challenges in Kurashiki.

Session 3: Innovations in English Education

9:45-10:30 Technology trends in language education in Japan

Dr. Neil Cowie, Okayama University

The Horizon Report summates and predicts technological trends worldwide, which is particularly important now as the pandemic of the last two years has digitally transformed education across the globe. The Horizon Report uses five categories to frame educational technology change: Social, Technological, Economic, Environmental and Political (STEEP). The report is written collaboratively by selected groups of experts in different countries, including Japan. However, the majority of selected contributors tend to be drawn mainly from Western countries, especially the US. The purpose of this presentation is to draw upon the collective wisdom of participants in JUEMUN 2022 as to whether such a systematic summary of technological developments is applicable to the Japanese context. The presenter will describe the main trends in the latest Horizon Report and invite JUEMUN

participants to add their own perspectives using the collaborative sharing tool, Padlet. It is intended to use this data as part of a wider collection of views on technology trends from Japan-based educators.

10:45-12:15 Engaging Students in Oral Histories Projects

Dr. Brent Jones, Konan University

This presentation outlines the design and development of an Oral Histories project taught in English for non-English majors at a medium-sized, private university in western Japan. The presentation starts with the structure of the 15-week project, goes on to describe the language and content goals, and eventually introduces student feedback and output. Highlighted throughout are links to global issues with local relevance. A list of useful resources and ideas will also be included for teachers/administrators hoping to start their own Oral Histories project.

13:30-14:30 How an Intercollegiate Online Conference

Can Impact Student Learning

Yuko Ikuta, Bunkyo University

Keiji Fujimura, Aichi Institute of Technology

Naomi Fujishima, Okayama University

Brent Jones, Konan University

Studies have shown that students involved in active learning gain more knowledge and communication skills than those in teacher-centered classes or traditional lecture settings. One effective method of promoting this is for students to learn from interacting with their peers. However, the recent global pandemic has made it challenging for teachers to offer in-person active learning due to various social distancing restrictions. In lieu of meeting face-to-face, the presenters worked together in 2021 to provide students the opportunity to conduct an online intercollegiate student conference. This presentation will outline three objectives of the online conference: (1) to provide students the chance of formally interacting with their peers in an intercollegiate setting; (2) to allow students to actively lead sessions in English; and (3) to help students evaluate their own speaking skills using a variety of online tools. In addition, the presenters will describe how the

student conferencing activities were monitored, and share their analyses of the post-conference survey results.

Session 4: United Nations Focus

14:30 - 15:30 Russia and Ukraine - A Common Decisive Response?

Dr. Thomas Weiler, Chair

United Nations Association of Germany (UNA Germany)

On February 24th of this year Ukraine was attacked. The Russian aggression has led to swift and decisive action in various international fora and organizations – most notably the UN, EU and NATO. What measures have been taken and how hard was it to reach the needed majority, sometimes consensus? Which options are still on the table? Do we need another “San Francisco Conference” for “UN 2.0?” How will the European landscape be reshaped and what challenges lie ahead?

15:45 - 16:15: UNICEF and its Global Mission

Yumi Matsuda, Kobe University of Foreign Studies

The United Nations Children’s Fund (UNICEF) is the world’s lead agency for children. UNICEF supports child health and nutrition, safe water and sanitation, quality education and skill building, HIV prevention and treatment for mothers and babies, and the protection of children and adolescents from violence and exploitation. Having served for this global organization for more than twenty years, in my presentation I will focus on how UNICEF has been helping the most vulnerable children and mothers through its interventions in some toughest parts of the world. I will also touch upon how UNICEF is structured, how UNICEF plans, what UNICEF prioritizes (present and future) and the existing challenges faced by UNICEF.

10:30-11:15 Model United Nations Simulations and English as a

Lingua Franca: New Perspectives on Best Practices

**Dr. Donna Tatsuki, Professor Emerita , Kobe University
of Foreign Studies**

Lori Zenuk Nishide, Kobe University of Foreign Studies

This presentation will give an overview of a newly published book *Model United Nations Simulations and English as a Lingua Franca: New Perspectives on Best Practices* from Cambridge Scholars. The book was compiled on the premise that one of the most important 21st century skills is the ability to negotiate constructive resolutions and that negotiation is a form of communication that requires more than just language ability. Added to this is the reality that the majority of English spoken globally is English as a Lingua Franca (ELF). Some insights drawn from research on ELF in MUN simulations and some of the best practices in MUN event and delegate preparation will be shared.

**11:30-12:15 Intra-linguistic Mediation within the Context of
Model United Nations**

Samuel Nfor, Seitoku University

This presentation is based on the rationale that when Japanese students participate in Model United Nations, they mediate concepts in a common language (English) they all speak differently to prevent communication breakdown, address global issues, and improve Intercultural Communicative Competence (ICC). Mediation is central in developing ICC because when people use language “it is not just to communicate a message, but rather to develop an idea or to facilitate understanding and communication” (Council of Europe 2018, p. 33). Mediation strategies were identified and coded from students’ recorded Model UN course and conference discussions for content analysis. Group interviews were fine-tuned through discussions amongst students and the researcher as moderator to generate ideas and patterns for thematic analysis. The results showed that by participating in Model UN courses and conferences, Japanese students improve ICC skills summarized as an “individual’s attitudes, knowledge, and skills related to intercultural competence while using a foreign language” (Byram 2021, p. 5).
